Brooklyn Park Police: Focusing on mental health

Brooklyn Park Police Department launched their new Mental Health Unit in June. Detective Samantha Brown, Senior Licensed Social Worker, Erin Buller and a part-time paid intern have been busy looking through cases and following up. So far this year they have averaged 84 mental health related calls per month.

"These calls for service are often time-consuming and difficult to resolve, and, on relatively rare occasions, result in tragic injuries or deaths," said Detective Brown.

Back in 2016, the Brooklyn Park Police Department started working on a plan to create a Mental Health Unit to address the drastically increasing need to help people suffering with mental health concerns in our community.

"Innovation has become increasingly important in addressing public safety issues."

Some of the goals of the Mental Health Unit are to:

- Provide better service to those suffering from mental illness
- Lower police conflict with a person suffering with mental illness
- Decrease the community impact of untreated mental illness

2017 mental health cases (736 total)

625 cases ended in a hospital transport
 Total cost for hospital transport: \$2.8 million

2018 mental health cases (836 total)

699 cases ended in a hospital transport Total cost for hospital transport: **\$3.1 million** "There is a population of people who either don't have access to services or are not aware of services," said Buller, whose salary is split 50/50 with Hennepin County. "Without these services, there is an increased likelihood that these individuals will continue to have frequent police interaction."

Detective Brown hopes to keep individuals living with mental illness from the cycle of entering

the criminal justice system by offering them support services.

"While we would like to provide outreach to everyone, there is no way we will be able to accommodate working with every person. Therefore, we will be prioritizing people who are repeat callers or that that have engaged in violence," said Detective Brown.

The Brooklyn Park Mental Health Unit hopes to improve outcomes for those living with mental illness and improve the overall sense of safety in the community.

Metro Blue Line Light Rail Transit (LRT) extension project



The planned METRO Blue Line LRT Extension project will bring light rail transit to the region's northwest communities as early as 2024. Construction on the METRO Blue Line Light Rail Transit extension is scheduled to begin in 2020. The line, also called the

Bottineau LRT, will run from downtown Minneapolis to Brooklyn Park through Golden Valley, Robbinsdale and Crystal.

The 13-mile route has five planned stations in Brooklyn Park. The line enters the city running on the existing railroad corridor next to Highway 81. At 73rd Avenue, the line swings east to connect with West Broadway Avenue. It continues up West Broadway before crossing Highway 610 with passenger service ending at Oak Grove Parkway.

Currently, the project still has a major hurdle to clear in that the Metropolitan Council has to come to agreement with the BNSF Railroad on sharing a portion of the railroad's right of way along Highway 81. Metropolitan Council staff met with BNSF staff in February 2019 to discuss the project but no progress has been made to date on an agreement. As a result, right of way acquisition activities along the corridor are on hold.

Planning beyond the rails


Temporary plaza at West Broadway and 85th Avenue



Bottineau Corridor wayfinding

Hennepin County and Bottineau Corridor communities are working on a wayfinding plan to better connect residents from METRO Blue Line Extension LRT stations to key community destinations and trail connections. From August to October 2019, SRF Consulting attended public events, placed input boards at key locations and held stakeholder meetings with residents, employers, employees, students and city staff to learn about issues and barriers. A draft plan is expected later this fall.

Free walk ups for recycling

Free walk up service for your recycling cart.

Residents with mobility concerns just need to get their cart outside their garage or by their stoop. Garbage companies may offer this service for a fee. Check with your hauler.

Use a low-salt diet on your driveway

Just one teaspoon of salt permanently contaminates five gallons of fresh water. So do your part to cut down on salt use this winter.

Shovel snow first, apply salt only to ice patches, use as little salt as possible and sweep up leftover salt when ice is gone.

Remember: More isn't better and sodium chloride, the most common deicer, stops working below 15° F.

What you need to know about the snow and parking

- No on-street parking 2–5 a.m., Oct. 15–April 15
- No on-street parking when a snow emergency is in effect
- Free 'snow emergency' parking is available at local parks

Tales from Tim's S Recycling Bin

A single solution

I was excited to hear about a campaign by a beer company that was giving out free six-packs if you collected bags of plastic litter removed from waterways. Alas, the campaign was limited to areas near the oceans.

Don't they know Minnesota has Lake Superior which is like an inland ocean? Heck, we have more than 10,000 lakes -that's a lot of water. But my obsession with getting free suds is distracting us from the main point. There's plastic in our waters and it's getting worse.

What are these plastics? The number one litter item found during beach cleanups is cigarette butts. Yes, they look like paper, but they're actually a composite of paper and plastic. Then food wrappers, bottle caps, beverage bottles and rounding out the top five: plastic bags.

What do these things have in common -other than being made from plastic? These are products that are designed to be used only once and then discarded. It's a category called single-use items.

In baseball a single is a good thing. But in the environment single use is becoming a bad thing. Because we have switched from things that we reused to disposable products and packaging we have lots

more waste to deal with. We can recycle some of it. But more and more of it is ending up in our ditches, our waterways and even in our wildlife. Dealing with the proliferation of plastics is the hottest topic in recycling circles. So much so that the European Union voted to ban single-use plastics by 2021.

And I'm trying to do my part by doubling down on alternatives to single-use items.

At the restaurant I now tell my server to skip the straw in my drink. I bring my reusable shopping bags to the store. For my morning coffee I brew it at home using a stainless-steel filter. These are all small steps, but they're steps. And if we all take a few steps, we'll end up going a long way toward protecting the environment.

Until next time, see what you can do to skip the single-use items my friends.
