Park Bond redevelopment projects

Park Center Dome project update

The City of Brooklyn Park and Osseo Area Schools have partnered to construct and operate the Brooklyn Park Sports Dome at Park Center Senior High. Construction of two artificial turf fields began in May 2019, followed by the construction of the dome support building which will be complete in Dec. 2019. One turf field will be covered by a 230' x 400' dome to allow year-round use. The dome is scheduled to open Jan. 6, 2020 for use by community athletic organizations as well as the general public during "open dome" times. A walking track surrounding the field will be available for use free of charge during scheduled times.

Brooklyn Park's Recreation and Parks Department is scheduling and managing the operations of the dome. For more information about hourly dome rental or open dome times, please visit www.brooklynpark.org/dome.

Update on Recreation and Park Development Projects

In our on-going efforts to improve the overall beauty of the parks and create opportunities for staying active and engaged throughout the community, the Recreation and Parks Department is currently working on the following park system improvement projects:

Redevelopment of neighborhood parks:

Three parks have been identified for redevelopment as part of the 2018 Park Bond Referendum:

- **Hartkopf Park:** Preliminary ideas include creating multi-purpose green space in the location of existing ballfields, additional parking, possibly adding a bathroom building and installing trail lighting for year-round use on loop trails.
- **Lakeland Park:** Preliminary concepts for redevelopment of Lakeland Park include adding community garden space, adding a basketball court, connecting a trail from the north end to the Crystal Lake Regional Trail and improving multi-purpose green space. The building is currently planned to be renovated starting in December using CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) funds.
- **Norwood Park:** Preliminary concepts include adding a park building that could support a youth summer camp with restrooms, replacing the shelter, creating multi-purpose field space, nature play area and trail connections to Queen Park.

These park redevelopment projects will go out to bid in 2020 with construction to take place in spring/fall 2021. Community feedback on the final vision for these parks is very important. We encourage you to attend one of the following community engagement meetings to provide input on each specific park.

- **January 14, 2020**–6:30 p.m. at Park Brook Elementary (*Hartkopf Park*)
- **February 4, 2020**–5:30 p.m. at Willows Apartments (*Lakeland Park*)
- **March 5, 2020**–6:30 p.m. at Palmer Lake Elementary (*Norwood Park*)

Redevelopment for River Park planned for spring 2020

After extensive community engagement, a master plan for River Park has been approved by City Council and the design and development phase of the project has begun. **A neighborhood community check-in will be held on Wednesday, Jan. 29 at 6:30 p.m. at the Izaak Walton League.**

Improvements include storm water treatment, shoreline stabilization, trail lighting, parking lot improvements, river overlook, canoe/kayak launch, nature play areas and shore fishing nodes. Construction is planned to begin in the late spring 2020 with a grand reopening planned for summer 2021. While the park is under construction there will be limited access to the park.

What's new?

New ordinance requires notification to tenants after ownership change

The Tenant Notification Ordinance places restrictions on the changes a new owner can make to a lease within the first three months of ownership. The new owner of a rental property with three or more units must provide information about the new ownership to all tenants within 30 days of sale. The notice must include if the new owner intends to make any of the following changes within the next three months:

- 1) increase the rent
- 2) require residents meet new criteria to live in the building
- 3) issue lease non-renewals without cause or as the result of rescreening
- 4) make a material change to the lease.

If the new owner makes any of the changes above and the tenant needs to move as a result, the tenant may be eligible for relocation assistance.

Pet licenses no longer required

On Nov. 12, 2019, City Council passed an ordinance amendment eliminating the city-issued pet license requirement. Some other key information to consider with this change:

- Animals must have identification tags on them at all times and up-to-date vaccinations
- You no longer need to have a license to use the two city dog parks
 - **Brookdale Park**, 7650 June Avenue North
 - **Environmental Nature Area**, 10201 West River Road

The city is in its annual recruitment process to fill upcoming openings on its commissions. No experience is necessary—only your commitment to building a strong and vibrant Brooklyn Park. Applications for the annual recruitment will be accepted through Jan. 31, 2020.

Fill out your application now to serve on the Budget Advisory Commission (BAC), Community Long-range Improvement Commission (CLIC), Human Rights Commission (HRC), Planning Commission or Recreation and Parks Advisory Commission (RPAC).

The time commitment is usually one meeting per month, but it varies between commissions. Commission meetings are open to the public so you may stop by and visit a commission before applying.

Improve water efficiency

The City of Brooklyn Park is making it easier for residents to save money on their water bills. Simply replace an older, less efficient toilet, clothes washer or irrigation system controller with a new, more efficient model and you can earn a rebate of up to \$100.

Irrigation systems, toilets and clothes washers are the biggest water users in most homes. Newer, more efficient models use up to 40% less water to do the same tasks. Which means replacements can pay for themselves in water and energy savings in as little as one year—even without a rebate.

But offering a rebate is a way to move us from thinking about replacing older appliances and controllers to doing it.

So how does the rebate work? Single-family homeowners and renters who purchase and

install a new WaterSense certified irrigation control system can earn a \$100 rebate. Townhome associations are eligible for up to three irrigation control system rebates. Homeowners and renters are also eligible for additional rebates of \$50 on a WaterSense certified toilet (up to two per home) and a \$50 rebate on an Energy Star certified clothes washer. New construction is not eligible.

This program is funded by a grant from the Metropolitan Council Environmental Services using Clean Water Land & Legacy Amendment funds appropriated by the Minnesota Legislature. There is a limited amount of rebate money available so get started on your project right away.

Paying for College

What is financial aid?

The easiest way I describe financial aid is to think of it as three things – free money, earned money, and borrowed money. Free money is grants and scholarships, earned money is work-study programs on campus, and borrowed money is student loans.

How can I finance my education?

The very first thing you need to do is complete the FASFA online at fafsa.gov. Regardless of your, or your parents' financial background, you will be eligible for something. There is more than enough financial aid you can receive, borrow, or earn to finance your education at NHCC.

Also, visit nhcc.edu/scholarships beginning February 1 to view and apply for scholarships. Scholarships may also be offered through your city, high school and local chamber. Another helpful resource is fastweb.com; after you set your preferences, it will send you scholarships that fit your profile.

Are there jobs on campus?

Yes, we have several work-study programs available on campus. If you're not eligible for work-study funds, you can still apply for other opportunities on campus.

Home care

Halt the salt



For those of us that live in the colder climates, winter time and ice can be anything from a nuisance to a hazard. We often use salt to reduce the dangers of ice and snow on our driveways and sidewalks.

While it's essential to keep safe in wintertime, it's important to note that salt doesn't just disappear when the snow and ice eventually melts. Instead, it can cause irreversible damage as it washes into our lakes and streams, and seeps into our groundwater supply.

Fortunately, you can help prevent salt pollution by limiting the amount of deicers you use on your driveways and sidewalks. Try to avoid using salt altogether. However, if safety concerns require you to control ice, consider following these simple tips to limit salt use:

- 1. Shovel.** Try to keep your driveway and walkways free from snow when it first falls.
- 2. Check the temperature—is it too cold for salt?** Most salts stop working around 15 degrees (F). When the temperatures drop, use sand for traction, but remember that sand doesn't melt ice.
- 3. Use salt sparingly.** Use no more than one pound of salt for 250 square feet. One heaping coffee mug is about one pound of salt and 250 square feet is roughly the size of two parking spaces.
- 4. Clean-up any extra salt.** If you can see sand or salt on dry pavement, it means that it is no longer working and could be washed away. Try to reuse salt or sand somewhere else or sweep it up and throw it away.
- 5. Tell a neighbor!** They may be over-salting too.

Tales from Tim's Recycling Bin

Battery recycling

It's the time of year where we burn through lots of batteries. What with electronic gadgets we got as presents or devices that light up during our long, dark nights. Devices and gadgets which all need that battery power to run right.

I picked the word "burn" on purpose. Because by now most of you have heard about the battery fire that led to Hennepin County pulling the battery recycling barrels from City Hall and the library. Yes, in addition to containing hazardous material, some rechargeable batteries can start fires if not disposed of properly.

In the waste industry there's a term called a "hot load" which is when the garbage or recycling starts on fire in the back of the truck. Google "hot load garbage truck" and you'll find stories from throughout

the country of drivers dropping a load of burning material out the back of their truck in order to prevent the truck from catching on fire and possibly exploding. In Minnesota, a recycling facility in Blaine was destroyed when a battery sparked a pile of paper on fire.

So, when your batteries die, don't dump them in your trash or recycling cart. You can still bring batteries to the Hennepin County Drop-Off Facility, 8100 Jefferson Highway. And we will continue taking them at the Special Materials Drop-Off Day.

If you can't remove the battery from the device (e.g. a small electronic device or a cordless screwdriver), bring the entire item to the Hennepin County Drop-Off Facility.

Until next time, keep recycling your batteries my friends.
