

CITY OF BROOKLYN PARK, MINNESOTA
MAYORAL DECLARATION NO. 2020-3 ESTABLISHING CURFEW

WHEREAS, by Mayoral Declaration No. 2020-2, I declared pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 12.29 that a Local Emergency existed in the City of Brooklyn Park as of 6:00 p.m. on May 29, 2020. As part of that declaration, I imposed a City-wide curfew on all public places, including streets, in the City of Brooklyn Park during specified time frames;

WHEREAS, by Resolution #2020-78, the Brooklyn Park City Council continued in effect the local emergency that I declared in Mayoral Declaration No. 2020-02;

WHEREAS, Resolution #2020-78 authorized me to continue to impose nightly curfews preventing the public from being in public places in the City of Brooklyn Park if I deem it to be in the public's interest to do so; and

WHEREAS, I have determined that it is in the public's interest to impose an additional nighttime curfew in the City of Brooklyn.

Based on the above, I impose a City-wide curfew on all public places, including streets, in the City of Brooklyn Park during the following time frames;


- From 10:00 p.m. on Monday, June 1, 2020 to 4:00 a.m. on Tuesday, June 2, 2020
- From 10:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 2, 2020 to 4:00 a.m. on Wednesday, June 3, 2020

All law enforcement, fire, and medical personnel, and any other personnel authorized by me are exempt from the curfew. Individuals seeking medical care, fleeing dangerous situations or homelessness are also exempt. For purposes of this emergency declaration, "travel" includes, without limitation, travel on foot, bicycle, skateboard, scooter, motorcycle, automobile, or public transit, or any other mode of transporting a person from one location to another, unless required to do so for work.

For purposes of this declaration, "public place" means any place, whether on privately or publicly owned property, accessible to the general public, including but not limited to public streets and roads, alleys, highways, driveways, sidewalks, parks, vacant lots, and unsupervised property. A violation of this declaration is a misdemeanor offense and is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1,000.00 or imprisonment for not more than 90 days, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 12.45.

The declaration shall be given prompt and general publicity.
