#### 2. OPEN FORUM-PUBLIC COMMENT AND RESPONSE

Director Tullberg responses to the public comment at the May meeting.

- A comment was that a promise had been made as part of the Park Bond Referendum to add more
  pickleball courts. He stated that more pickleball courts were not part of the park bond referendum.
  However, staff continue to look for places in the park system to add additional courts.
- Comments were made regarding the proposed redevelopment at the CAC regarding ice rink 2. He
  stated that follow up meetings have been held with both the Osseo Maple Grove Hockey
  Association and the Three Rivers Figure Skating Association. Staff are working on a date to meet
  with Champlin Park Youth Hockey Association. Additional clarity was provided on the status of the
  project and what are the future steps. Staff heard from the organizations the future needs of ice
  and make up of their organization.

## 6. GENERAL INFORMATION - PRESENTATIONS

1. RECREATION & PROGRAM SERVICES DIVISION UPDATE

Director Tullberg introduced Recreation and Program Services Manager Jen Gillard.

Manager Gillard provided a PowerPoint presentation (attached).

## **Questions and Comments**

- Commissioner Lande asked if there were other ways for people to participate in swim classes who have limited income? Manager Gillard stated that they can enroll through our scholarship program and that covers both youth and adults.
- Commissioner Purcell asked for an explanation of Futsal? Manager Hill stated that it is basically indoor soccer.
- Commissioner Hoang asked for clarification on enrollment of pickleball? Manager Gillard responded that it was 56 people who played 49,140 hours of pickleball. Director Tullberg stated that we do need more indoor space for pickleball.
- Commissioner Erickson asked for clarification on who runs all the leagues, i.e. softball, pickleball, basketball? Manager Gillard stated that it is run by Brooklyn Park staff.
- Commissioner Lande asked if the 13 -15 year olds in the Leader in Training are paid? Manager Gillard stated no. Commissioner Lande asked how many participant? Manager Gillard stated there are up to 10 each year.
- Commissioner Hoang asked for confirmation that they become staff after training? Manager Gillard stated they are required to go through the interview process as anyone would.
- Commissioner Lande asked what the average family would pay? Manager Gillard stated that it is under \$40.00/day. Summer camp is available for tiered pricing.
- Commissioner Hoang stated he has enrolled his kids at Northwoods.
- Commissioner Lande asked if all senior activities are held at the CAC? Manager Gillard stated that all programming is held at CAC except for the bus tours.
- Commissioner Lande asked for clarification on the numbers shown on the presentation for enrollment? Manager Gillard stated that enrollments could mean a person, or it could be a person who signed up multiple times. It is not participants.
- Commissioner Gomez asked about the Happy Hour event at the Historic Eidem Farm (HEF)?
   Manager Gillard stated that this was a new idea that brings in people that might not otherwise go to the HEF. This is part of the new program staff are doing to make the HEF more relevant to the residents.
- Commissioner Lande asked if the new signage pays homage to the Native American cultures that were here before us. Manager Gillard stated that they do.
- Commissioner Erickson asked about the open gate hours at Historic Eidem Farm. Manager Gillard provided they are similar to last year. The website is also a good source.
- Commissioner Parks asked if it was decided to rule out busing in school kids? Manager Gillard stated the staff is in the process of redesigning the tour so that they are more relevant to school age and not just preschool. Director Tullberg added that we don't have bathrooms with running water, only portable toilets which the schools tend to decide not to come when they hear that. The visitor center is still a topic of discussion to be determined if it is still feasible.
- Commissioner Birdnecklace asked if the City Council has addressed the project management issue? Director Tullberg said it has not been brought to City Council.
- Commissioner Lande asked if the snowshoes are housed at the farm or if they are brought there?
   She stated that she has seen other communities bring snowshoes to resident apartment buildings.
   Manager Gillard stated that RecOnTheGo and Fusion have an agreement with Three Rivers Park District to share equipment.
- Commissioner Hoang asked about Tater Daze program that was ended due to some unfortunate issues? Manager Gillard stated that the event was broken up into individual events which has helped curb the large concentration of individuals.
- Commissioner Parks stated that the city use to bring in marching bands but it has became too
  expensive to pay them.
- Commissioner Lande asked if we have connections with drum and bugle corps? Manager Gillard confirmed that there are a couple of groups coming. All groups now charge to march.
- Commissioner Murray asked if there was a specific event held for Hmong New Year? Manager Gillard stated that for the last two years staff has partnered with Minnesota Zej Zog to provide a celebration that is open to the public.

- Commissioner Birdnecklace asked what are the challenges for recruitment for aquatics staff?
  Manager Gillard said that traditionally staff would go through the schools and recruit from the swim
  teams. Staff has found that members of swim teams do not have the time. Staff now attempts to
  recruit anyone that is interested in swimming and then putting them through a training program
  through the city. Cassidy Wester who is the Program Specialist for Aquatics is going to go through
  the Life Guard training to become an instructor which will provide staff the means to train lifeguards
  here.
- Commissioner Quigley stated that she was on the swim team for Champlin Park and did not recall
  anyone from the city advertising for employment. Manager Gillard stated that city staff does not
  have a good connection with Champlin Park staff. Other schools were more open to allowing city
  staff to come in. At Champlin Park city staff relied on the school's aquatic staff passing it on to the
  swimmers.
- Commissioner Birdnecklace asked if the city communication department was involved in advertising job openings? Manager Gillard stated that staff uses the city communication department as well as setting up open houses at CAC and Zanewood.
- Commissioner Gomez stated that his business has seen difficulty in hiring at \$18.00/hour. Manager Gillard stated that the city revised the pay plan this year.





## **Brooklyn Park Youth Outreach Team and Intervention Services**

The Brooklyn Park Youth Outreach Team works M-F from 5:00-9:00pm each day in the community connecting young people to resources, redirecting negative energy, sharing positive activities, and working in partnership with police to maintain a safe and healthy community.

**Intervention Team** is increasing access of Intervention Services with a form that is accessible through a QR code to providers and people supporting young people. This form is used to connect and provide essential services.

#### **Adult Fitness**

Summer Adult fitness classes are continuing through the next few months and will end the week of August 28. A jam-packed summer schedule has been set for fitness classes that includes the following: Monday & Wednesday morning fitness classes, Tuesday evening yoga classes, and Wednesday evening AfroBeats Dance workout classes. All classes are scheduled at the CAC. The fitness program is also excited to share that a new Adult Fitness Instructor, Jenilee Davidson, has been brought on as an independent contractor to run additional morning fitness classes for the community. Jenilee brings forth extensive experience working with adults of all ages and abilities in a fitness setting and is working with staff to enhance the schedule of fitness offerings. Jenilee will begin her contract on Tuesday and Friday mornings July-August.

Back by popular demand, the AfroBeats Dance workout class will be continuing at the City of Brooklyn Park this summer with two, 6-week sessions that will be held outdoors at the CAC. Class begins June 13.

The Living Well Resource Fair was hosted at the Community Activity Center on Friday, May 19, 10 am -2 pm. This annual event is a free open house including community resource exhibitors, speakers, health screenings, and light refreshments for older adults, individuals with disabilities, and care givers.

## Weekly Adult Social Groups

Weekly social activity groups continue to renew 2023 yearly membership, with 159 people enrolled in one or more weekly activities. Members have access to 14 activity groups per week. The Celebrate Brooklyn Park Tater Daze Parade and Community Market on June 3 went very well with over 1,000+ attendees. A total of 65 parade units participated including internal programs such as Rec on the Go, Aquatics, and Summer Camp.

Planning is underway for the annual Arts Festival on Saturday, June 24. This event includes local vendors, performances, and food trucks at Plaza Park from 1-4pm. Upcoming events include Summer Splash on Friday, July 7 and Brooklyn Park Night Out on Friday, July 28

#### **Farmers Market**

Vendor applications have closed and 20 applicants were accepted to the 2023 Farmers Market. Orientation for vendors will be held on June 28 from 4-5pm. Vendors range from produce, soaps, hair care, baked goods, and food trucks. The market has a new location this year at North Hennepin Community College parking lot, which will help make the market more visible and accessible to the public. Market runs Wednesdays 2-6pm starting July 11 – October 12.

## **Aquatics**

Summer Aquatic programming began Tuesday, June 20<sup>th</sup> with classes incluing group, private & paired lessons, adaptive aquatics classes, adult lessons, aqua teen classes, morning swim teams, and our new Women & Girls only swim class taking place on Monday evenings. Classes run on Monday-Thursday morning and daytime, with open swim to the community offered Monday & Wednesday afternoons, and M&W or T&Th evening lesson availability. Classes for summer 2023 will be operated at Jackson Middle School Pool.

Aquatics will be hosting another Swim Assessment Day on Friday, August 25 from 5:30-7:30 PM at the Brooklyn Middle School Pool. This event is for new and/or returning participants to be assessed on their swimming skills and provided the correct level of swimming to enroll in on registration day, that will open Tuesday, August 29.

## **Adaptive Recreation/ Inclusion Services:**

The Summer Session of Adaptive Recreation starts up the week of June 20 – 23. Program offerings include: adaptive aquatics and adaptive fitness classes, as well as Reach for Resources Adaptive Recreation programs. The summer months is our busiest season for Inclusion Services within all of our recreation programs. A team of 14 Inclusion Specialists will work within a variety of recreation programs and services, providing support for participants with disability-related needs, medical conditions, and severe allergies. Recreation programs and services include: Summer Camp, ROTG, Summer Fusion, Aquatics, Youth Sports, Ice Skating, and more.

Staff are excited to offer the third annual Adaptive Baseball/ Softball with the Minnesota Twins, as part of the Adaptive Rec Fridays summer series, on Friday, June 16 from 10:00am – 12:00pm at Todd Anderson Field. This is a partnership program between Brooklyn Park Adaptive Recreation, Courage Kenny Rehabilitation Institute's Sports & Recreation Department, and the Minnesota Twins Community Fund. Registration is at full capacity with 30 youth and teens with physical and cognitive disabilities ready to join in the fun. Participants will enjoy adaptive baseball/ softball activities, a visit from TC Bear, FREE custom jerseys, FREE tickets, along with a few other surprises. Staff are looking forward to hosting this great event again this year.

The last Our Dance Place Spring Social took place on Thursday, June 1 from 5:30 – 8:00pm at the CAC. This is a partnership program with a non-profit organization, Our Dance Place, that provides social events for people with disability- related needs. Staff welcomed approximately 40 attendees, including Personal Caregivers. Attendees enjoyed dancing, socializing, and Godfather's pizza – free of cost due to sponsorship from the Brooklyn Park Police Department.

#### **Dance**

Registration is open for the 2023-24 dance season. This year is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Brooklyn Park Dance. Introductory summer classes are scheduled for July for dancers ages 3-8 who are interested in trying dance for the first time.

## **Summer Camp**

Summer Camps open for the summer on Tuesday, June 20. Staff have planned 8 weeks of engaging and fun activities for young people ages 5-12. Teens Outdoors and Leader in Training for ages 13-15 will begin at the CAC on June 20.

## **Youth Sports**

Summer classes began Tuesday, June 20 and include gymnastics, tennis camp, World Cup Soccer, Rookie Roundballers Basketball, t-ball, and sports sampler.Lil Tykes and Tiny Tot programs for children aged 2-4 begin June 20. Youth Sports classes are designed to be an introduction to sports and include athletic skill development along with social-emotional learning.

## **Adult Sports**

#### Overview:

### 1. MISSISSIPPI GATEWAY REGIONAL PARK / ENVIRONMENTAL NATURE AREA

Funding Source(s): OSLAD Fund

## **Project Update**:

Development of the Brooklyn Park side of the park includes expansion of the off-leash dog area, relocation of the archery range, addition of a large picnic shelter and restroom facilities along with an expanded parking area is anticipated to begin in the spring of 2023.

The project was advertised for bid beginning February 16, 2023 with bids being due on March 16, 2023. Project contracts were awarded on March 30, 2023. Utility and initial construction is planned to begin during the summer of 2023. Staff have been working on the project so that it will be phased now to allow the dog park to be used throughout most of the project. Construction will continue in 2024 and 2025 and a re-grand opening will be held in 2026. Construction began on April 17, 2023 tree removal for the project area 2023 to be completed in 2023.

#### **New Update**

A Ground Breaking ceremony was held on June 14<sup>th</sup> to commemorate the start of construction. Beginning June 15<sup>th</sup> West River Road will have a road closure so the contractor can install the utilities for the project. Residents and the community have been notified.

## 2. HOMETOWN BALLFIELD at Noble Sports Park (September 2022 – May 2023)

Funding Source(s): Park Bond Reinvestment Project

**Project Update:** The Hometown Ballfield project was approved at the July 11, 2022 City Council meeting. The city has approved and processed purchase orders to Upper Midwest Athletic Construction (UMAC) and SAAFE. UMAC will prepare all site work except bleachers and press box. SAAFE will construct the bleachers and the press box. Construction began September 15<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

Construction started the first week of October. Concrete for batting cages, dugouts and bleachers have been poured. Backstop has been installed. Dugouts were installed in late March. Currently waiting for grandstand and pressbox to be delivered and installed. Construction is substantially complete with a few punch list items remaining. The baseball field held its first game on June 8<sup>th</sup>.

#### 3. EAB UPDATE

Funding Source(s): Heritage Fund

**Project Update:** Work will continue in 2023. As part of our ongoing Grant work 50 new trees were planted at Trinity Gardens Park on June 1<sup>st</sup>.

### 4. NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

Funding Source(s): Park Bond Reinvestment Project & Heritage Fund

<u>Project Update:</u> Staff continues reviewing priorities of the Natural Resource Management Plan. A Five-Year Priority Implementation Plan has been developed by working with Stantec. Work will continue in 2023 in key park areas.

## 5. COMMUNITY ACTIVITY CENTER IMPROVEMENTS

(2022 planning, 2023-2024 construction)

Funding Source(s): Park Bond Reinvestment Projects

## • COMMUNITY ACTIVITY CENTER

<u>Project Overview:</u> The plan is to improve the entrance to the facility, create an accessible customer service desk, update bathrooms, and create a welcoming and inviting community center for all customers.

Staff worked with the JLG/292 Design Group to evaluate the possibility of converting one ice arena into three basketball courts. A final concept design was provided to staff in January and refined in February. JLG/292 Design Group provided cost estimates in the range of \$12 - \$15 million for the improvements to the CAC including improved entrances, informal gathering space, relocated office space, improved parking and possible Arena conversion to gym space. The City of Brooklyn Park was awarded \$5 million in state bonding funds during the 2023 Legislative Session to support the improvements to the Community Activity Center. A conversation about several large City of Brooklyn Park projects will be held in July to determine next steps.

**Project Update:** No new updates

## • SENIOR CENTER (2023 planning, 2023-2024 construction)

<u>Project Overview:</u> This improvement would add dedicated space for senior programming and adult fitness space. Final design and components will be developed when a final location is determined. The Senior Center is being considered with the CAC improvements and Fire Station projects. If a new Central Fire station is constructed on the site of the former Hennepin County Library, the current Central Fire Station could be remodeled into a new space dedicated to fitness and social activities for older adults

**Project Update:** No new update

## • TEEN CENTER (2022-23 planning, 2023-2024 construction)

**Project Overview:** The Zanewood Recreation Center has been a popular hub for youth services and recreation activities. The programming happening the space has outgrown the facility and additional program space is needed. Staff will work with a design consultant to determine if new space should be constructed, existing space should be renovated, or a combination of both.

<u>Project Update:</u> Zanewood staff have been meeting bi-weekly to discuss the mission, vision, goals, and amenities of the new Youth and Teen Recreation Center. The Zanewood staff has also met with the Communications Manager to develop a strategic communication plan to inform the public about the project along with updates, pictures, and social media campaigns. Staff selected Design by Melo to lead the community engagement, pre-design and design process. The project kickoff meeting was held April 6, 2023. Staff are currently in phase 1 of the project. Phase 1 includes: staff interviews, program observations, facility assessments, community engagement strategic planning

meetings, and first design concepts. Staff have set dates to begin the community engagement efforts in June through the summer. These community engagement efforts will consist of staff engagement with Youthprise at Zanewood and work with our community engagement division within the city to spread the message of the new Teen center at community events. The plan is to engage with the residents at different summer programming and our large-scale community events. The City of Brooklyn Park has submitted a \$4 million request for federal funding through Senator Klobuchar and Representative Phillips office to help support the Youth and Teen Recreation Center project.

#### 6. HISTORIC EIDEM FARM INTERPRETIVE SIGNAGE DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Funding Source(s): Park Bond Reinvestment Projects

<u>Project Update:</u>. Staff have engaged with Bluestem Heritage Group to help develop the design and signage language for each individual sign and kiosk. The design work for the signs and the kiosk are complete and quotes are being solicited for signage and kiosk fabrication. A separate plan will be prepared to obtain quotes to install the accessible paths and the concrete slabs for the signs to be surface mounted. The project is planned to be completed by this fall.

## 7. CENTRAL PARK TENNIS COURT REHABILITATION

Funding Source(s): Heritage Fund

<u>Project Update:</u> The color coating of the court will be completed in the spring of 2023. The color coating was completed the first week of June. This project is now complete.

## 8. PLAYGROUND REPLACEMENT

Funding Source(s): Heritage Fund

<u>Project Update:</u> The replacement of Edinbrook, Sunny Acres & Lakeland Parks playgrounds was approved by City Council on December 12, 2022. Installation will take place in 2023 due to production and supply chain issues that delay equipment delivery. Staff will be using Auction Masters for the disposal process of the three parks for the first time. The old playgrounds at all three parks have been removed. The new playground is installed at Sunny Acres however the safety surfacing is not yet complete. Installation at the other two parks should be complete by mid June. It is anticipated that the City Park playground will also be replaced in 2023 project.

## 9. HISTORIC EIDEM FARM VISITOR CENTER (2022 planning, 2023-24 construction)

Funding Source(s): Park Bond Reinvestment Projects

#### Overview:

## 1. CAC Renovations

The City of Brooklyn Park received \$5M in State of MN Bonding funds for improvements at the Community Activity Center. The full project would feature improvements to the facility entrances, potential conversion of one ice arena to gymnasium space, improved parking and outdoor event space. Next steps likely will be to do the structural analysis to be sure that the possible conversion of ice arena 1 could support the change to gym space. Also, a work session conversation with the City Council is planned for July 31st to discuss a number of big projects on the horizon across the city.

## 2. Celebrate Brooklyn Park Tater Daze Parade and Community Market

The annual Brooklyn Park Tater Daze Parade was held June 3<sup>rd</sup>. A total of 63 units participated in the parade. The attendance was good but not great. After a two year hiatus due to the pandemic, staff will look at ways to improve attendance including researching a different weekend, hosting the parade on a Thursday, and looking at other possible routes.

The Brooklyn Park Tater Daze Community Market was held after the parade at Noble Sports Park. Attendance at this event was also good but not great. Staff will debrief and look at options to improve this event in the future.

A broader discussion about city events will take place with City Council on July 31 during a work session.

## 3. Graphic Design staffing changes

Deb Hommer was hired as the new Graphic Design staff person in Recreation & Parks/Communications. She will fill the position to be vacated by Pat Milton who is retiring from the City of Brooklyn Park on June 30, 2023.

## 4. Seasonal Staff Hiring

Staff are kicking off the busiest portion of the seasonal hiring process. Each year, Recreation & Parks hires approximately 200 seasonal employees. Training for most of these new staff members is being held during the week of June 12. Summer programming starts on June 20<sup>th</sup> due to the June 19<sup>th</sup> Juneteenth Holiday.
